# Meet Brisbane Village Helping Hands Volunteer Karen Cunningham

When Karen Cunningham lived in San Francisco, her friends joked that she should move to Brisbane, since she was from Australia, a country with a city of the same name.

“I told them I don’t do suburbs; I’m a city girl,” recalls Cunningham. But she reconsidered big-city life after becoming a mom, and took a drive to check out nearby Brisbane, which at one time shared “sister city” status with its Australian counterpart.

“I realized it wasn’t the suburbs at all. To me it was a country town that was beautiful. I was mesmerized by the mountain. I could tell there was something special about living here. I loved that it was a small, tightknit community.”

After moving to Brisbane in 1994, she became an active volunteer. A small business owner, she helped fundraise for Brisbane Elementary School, served on Community Emergency Volunteers and was a Planning Commission member. This past November, she was elected to City Council.

“When I lived in San Francisco you couldn’t just walk into the mayor’s office or speak to the chief of police on the telephone. But these things happen in Brisbane. I love living in a community that’s small enough for individuals to make a difference.”

Four years ago, she attended a meeting to explore the concept of creating a “village” in Brisbane. The idea elicited enthusiasm from community members, and was the springboard to creating Brisbane Village Helping Hands, a nonprofit, grassroots organization dedicated to help older residents “age in place” by matching them with volunteers willing to provide transportation, small home repairs, technology assistance and friendly visits, among other things.

“My reaction was that it was the perfect solution to a huge problem facing every community,” says Cunningham. Since BVHH was launched in 2016, she has accepted numerous volunteer “requests” and enjoys doing so tremendously. She has provided members with rides to appointments and assisted in other areas as needed.

“Karen Cunningham and her helpers recently removed an old recliner for me and took it downstairs to be picked up by SSF Scavenger,” says Judy Moffitt, a BVHH member. “Thanks to them, something I could not do was done – and with smiles all around.”

Cunningham observes that assisting in small ways can make a big difference to those who need an occasional helping hand.

“For volunteers, it’s just a small part of our day,” she says. “It might just take 30 minutes or an hour to provide a ride, change someone’s lightbulb or pick up their groceries. I love that village volunteering is flexible. All of the people I’ve helped are so appreciative – and the selfish part is that it also makes me feel good. The social events are fun, and do a great job of bringing people together.”

BVHH receives support from the City of Brisbane and Brisbane Lions Club. Volunteers have completed nearly 250 requests to assist members, and three social events have been well-attended.

With 53 volunteers and 51 members age 55 and older, BVHH has plenty of room for newcomers who would like to join. The cost is only \$20 per year for members; volunteers are requested to pay a small, one-time fee for a background check. (Many residents are both volunteers and members.)

## A Note from Brisbane PD

We have received a few questions from citizens regarding the increase in parking enforcement around the City. Generally speaking, most of our parking enforcement efforts are complaint-driven. Some areas that we have been concentrating on are white line violations, vehicles that block the sidewalk, and vehicles making U-turns at Visitacion and Mariposa. Also, we have received complaints about vehicles parked for extended periods in the 24 minute zones at the top of Visitacion.

In the case of vehicles parked on the sidewalks, we have done a number of outreach efforts in order to educate the public and attempt to gain compliance before resorting to enforcement. It is our preference to educate first, but unfortunately that may not always be the case. Our mission is to keep the roadways and sidewalks safe for those who travel them. Most of the citations that we issue are for behavior that people

know is illegal. We ask that everyone be courteous to those around you when it comes to your parking and driving habits. If we all take the time to do the right thing, our town will be safer and it will be less likely that anyone will receive a citation.

At the May 17th City Council Meeting, San Bruno Mountain Watch received approval from the Council to create a new landscape, the San Bruno Mountain Civic Garden, outside of City Hall.

The garden will be planted exclusively with plants that are sourced from and native to San Bruno Mountain, grown with the help of volunteers at San Bruno Mountain Watch's local Mission Blue Nursery.

**Safe Community** – Residents and visitors will experience a sense of safety


**Community Building** – Brisbane will honor the rich diversity of our city (residents, organizations, businesses) through community engagement and participation

# Your Water Bill Explained

Ever wonder what those line items on your bi-monthly bill represent? Well we have that below, but first, let's start with a broad overview of what it takes to maintain the City's water and sewer system. Overall, the City collects about 65% of its revenues based on the amount of water that is used and 35% from base charges. The City's costs are actually the reverse of this - only 30% of our costs are based on water purchases and wastewater treatment; the remaining 70% are fixed costs for maintenance staff, required testing, and general maintenance of the system. Therefore, as revenues go down with reduced water usage (i.e. during a drought), the City may\* need to increase rates to ensure our continued ability to provide clean and safe water as well as proper disposal of wastewater so it doesn't impact the ecosystem.

Now, below are explanations of the various charges on your bi-monthly water and sewer bill are determined.

**Water Use** - Charge is based on the number of units of water used in a two month period.

**Water Service** - A flat amount based on the size of the meter.

**Sewer** - Charge is based on the amount of water used during the winter months (Mid-October to Mid-February). It changes once a year on the April bill.

**Capital Project Charge** - Charge is based on the amount of water used between Mid-February and Mid-June. It changes once a year in August. This charge pays for a \$5,000,000 bond for capital projects, and was approved by the Council on November 20, 2014, and became effective with the March 2015 bill.

**Drought Contingency Charge** - Charge is based on whether the user is a residential/commercial account or landscape account. If it is a residential/commercial account then the charge is either \$2.32 a billing period if the account uses less than the median amount of water used by other users or \$6.99 a billing period if they use more. Landscape users are charged \$102.14 a billing period. During the last drought the City was down \$400,000 in revenues for the year.

\*The City Council determined that instead of increasing rates during a drought, we should set up a reserve account. The Drought Contingency Charge was therefore established, and became effective with the April 2018 bill. The fund will accumulate money so rates do not need to be increased during periods of droughts.



## New Brisbane Library Update

In 2014, the Council identified the L.T. Clarke/5 Star Café site as the preferred site for the new Brisbane Library and afterwards formed a Library Planning Stakeholder Group. This group is comprised of representatives from the Friends of the Brisbane Library, Mothers of Brisbane, San Mateo County Library Staff, Brisbane School District, BEST/PTO, City Council (1 member, plus 1 alternate), a Parks and Recreation Commissioner, the City Manager, and the Public Works Director.

- Library Planning Stakeholder Group (LPSG) reviews architectural-engineering RFPs (early 2016)
- LPSG recommends architectural and design firm (Siegel & Strain) to Council (April, 2016)
- 50% design of the New Brisbane Library to Council (November 3, 2016 meeting)
- Council adopts a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND)\* for the new Library (February 2, 2017 meeting)
- Council approves final design of the Library and invites construction bids (March 15, 2018 meeting)
- Council awards construction contract (May 17, 2018 meeting)

- Construction of the Library starts (expected Summer 2018)
- Construction ends (expected Summer/Fall 2019)

As far as funding goes, the County Board of Supervisors voted to authorize \$300K in Measure A funds for design purposes at their March 29, 2016 meeting. The County Library System will provide \$400,000 for furniture and furnishings. The Friends of the Brisbane Library are setting out to raise \$100,000 for the new Brisbane Library. More to come in future STAR issues on how the donor wall will look and how your donation will be represented. We've done stars at the playground, bricks at the skatepark, and now, the Friends of the Brisbane Library Board are determining what the next donor installation in Brisbane will look like. If you're interested in learning more, join them at their next Board meeting, taking place on Tuesday, June 19th at 7pm at the Library.

At their March 15th City Council Meeting, the Brisbane City Council approved an agreement with the County of San Mateo for a \$1.7 million loan at an interest rate of 1.2% for 15 years. The estimated cost of the Library ended up being \$9,065,000. Approximately \$3.6 million would come from City funds, with all of its Business License revenue dedicated to Capital Improvements.

\*The Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) study found that the new Library would not have a significant effect on the environment because mitigation measures have been incorporated into the project.

## High School Bus Update

On May 21st, SamTrans staff met with concerned Brisbane parents to discuss High School bus transportation starting in August 2018. Both the parents that attended and SamTrans reported having a very productive meeting; Brisbane parents were very happy that their concerns were being taken seriously. There are still a number of decisions to be made, work to be done, and alternatives to be explored. At the time of this printing, SamTrans is planning on improving the transfer between the 121 and the 110 routes so that students from Southern Hills won't miss the transfer. They are also looking at extending the 49 to Brisbane so that students from Brisbane

will have a "one-seat" ride to Terra Nova. Additional tweaks will be made over the next few weeks, after which SamTrans will present final routes for the upcoming 2018-19 school year.
