June 2018 Election News

The California Voter's Choice Act is a new law passed in 2016 that will modernize elections in California by allowing counties to conduct elections under a new model which provides greater flexibility and convenience for voters. The Statewide Direct Primary Election, taking place on June 5, 2018, will be the first time the new election model is enacted.

This new election model allows voters to choose how, when, and where to cast their ballot by:

- Mailing every voter a ballot
- Expanding in-person early voting
- Allowing voters to cast a ballot at any vote center within their county

Brisbane City Hall (50 Park Place) will actually be one of the 30 Vote Centers that will be open June 2 - 5, three days prior to Election Day. Its hours BEFORE Election Day will be 9am - 5pm and 7am - 8pm ON Election Day. In accordance with the law, there will be 5 Vote Centers open for 10 days before Election Day and 4 Vote Centers open 29 days before Election Day. Also important to note: The June 5, 2018 Statewide Direct Primary Election is an

all-mailed ballot election. Every eligible voter will be mailed a ballot and can vote by mail or cast their ballot in person at a Vote Center during the times and days specified above. **The first day Vote by Mail ballots will be mailed to registered voters in the County is May 7, 2018, with Ballot Drop-Off locations open throughout the County starting May 8th (there will be a Ballot Drop-off Box at Brisbane City Hall as well).**

Not registered to vote? Visit <https://www.smcacre.org/register-vote> by May 21st to get registered online. You can also register to vote via the mail (postmarked by May 21st). Just complete a Voter Registration Form, which you can find at City Hall. Note: you must re-register to vote if you change your name, address, or want to change your political affiliation (party). Lastly, you can also register to vote or update your registration at any Vote Center location even on Election Day. How Brisbane PD is Addressing Homelessness

When an encampment is reported, such as the ones at the Lagoon at Sierra Point, or off of Bayshore Boulevard, it is the goal of the Code Enforcement Officer and the Brisbane Police Department to work with those individuals to get them the resources they need to improve their living situation.

Shutting down a homeless encampment usually requires cleaning up camp sites and includes strategies to find permanent help for those individuals and discourage their return. Our Department's procedure for shutting down homeless encampments is as follows:

1. Visit the encampment to determine:
 - how many people live there and if they have any special needs
 - if there are any environmental hazards that need to be handled by trained personnel
 - the proper deployment of the Code Enforcement Officer and others (such as South San Francisco Scavengers) to adequately carry out the plan.
2. Determine which enforcement agencies have jurisdiction in the encampment area. Sometimes, there is more than one, as is often the case in areas where encampments may cross over onto CalTrans or CalTrain territory. Also, the laws pertaining to legality of encampments vary depending on whether the land is privately or publicly owned.
3. Meet with representatives from homeless advocacy groups, such as LifeMoves or Samaritan House, to advise them of our plan. We often invite the Homeless Outreach Team to come along on our subsequent contacts with transients at the encampment. They have programs that combine shelter/housing with comprehensive services that enable homeless families and individuals to rapidly return to stable housing and long-term self-sufficiency. These programs are free of charge for our citizens in need.
4. Provided that the homeless individual is in agreement, we arrange alternate shelter for all homeless before we begin to remove them from the encampment.
5. Provide all homeless with a written notice advising:
 - they are violating the law by camping in the site under the freeway overpass, etc.
 - they are subject to further law enforcement if they remain in the area
 - by which date they must vacate the area (usually within 72 hours).
6. After the posted date passes, we return to the encampment and issue citations to those still there, tell them the date by which they must vacate and that they will be subject to arrest and

seizure of property if they do not leave by then.

After all the above steps, the encampment site is cleaned up. Sometimes, we may ask that any excessive foliage that hides the encampment area be cut back. The last thing we do is contact the Homeless Outreach Team to check on the individual(s) and see if they are getting the help that they need.

This is an example of "typical" enforcement. Every once in a while it may take longer to abate an encampment because the encampment maybe located on CalTrans' right-of-way and then it will be up to that agency to determine when they are able to abate the encampment.

The City's view of SB 35

What SB 35 Means for the City of Brisbane

And Specifically, the Brisbane Baylands

If you've been following reports on the State's housing shortage, then you've likely heard mention of Senate Bill 35 (SB 35). SB 35 was approved in 2017 and

announced, a development on Bryant St. in San Francisco (130 units, 65 affordable or low-income).

To be subject to the SB 35 process, a residential project must qualify under a lengthy list of criteria. Some of these include: a minimum percentage of units set aside for low income residents (up to 50% depending on the jurisdiction), adherence to construction labor standards pertaining to use of a skilled workforce and payment of prevailing wages, and compliance with all objective development standards established by the local jurisdiction.

establishes a streamlined development review process for new multi-family residential projects that meet the requirements established in the legislation. The intent of SB 35 is to promote the construction of new housing in California in response to historic trends where housing production has not kept pace with population growth. You may be wondering if or how SB 35 affects Brisbane and the Baylands in particular. This is the City's view.

There are also limitations on potential development sites where SB 35 can be applied. Sites with environmental constraints such as hazardous materials contamination, flood zones, and wetlands are ineligible to utilize SB 35. Additionally, SB 35-eligible sites must be infill (e.g., at least 75% surrounded by urban development) and zoned for residential uses.

SB 35 Generally

Developers can utilize the streamlining provisions of SB 35 in any jurisdiction in California where housing production has not met or exceeded targets set by the State through what is called the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) process. A vast majority of the 500+ cities and counties throughout the state are potentially subject to SB 35, as housing production targets have only been met in 13 jurisdictions statewide. Regional application of SB 35 has been utilized in the Bay Area so far, with developers apparently invoking SB 35 to streamline the review process for three projects in the region to date. These include a complex on the Vallco shopping center site in Cupertino (2,400 units, 1,200 affordable or low-income), another on 4th St. in West Berkeley (260 units, 130 affordable or low-income) and, just

SB 35's Application to Brisbane and the Baylands

Recent housing production in Brisbane has not fully met state-imposed targets, so SB 35 applies to Brisbane. However in regard to the Baylands, the Baylands is not zoned for residential uses and the site has toxic contamination which has not been remediated to allow for residential uses. These two factors alone render the Baylands ineligible for SB 35 streamlining.

Brisbane CERT Is Active Again!

On a sunny Saturday morning, March 31, 2018, Brisbane CERT gathered for the inaugural CERT activity of the program rebuilding effort. A group of dedicated CERT Advisory Committee Members tackled the sizable and significant tasks of inventorying, cleaning and organizing both the City's EOC (Emergency Operations Center) Trailers that store disaster response supplies and the CERT backpacks containing safety equipment and tools. Brisbane CERT's Walt Long also participated in the county-wide Simplex Radio Drill on April 14 at the Marina. These undertakings were completed in support of the City's commitment to reestablish, strengthen and grow the CERT Program in Brisbane.

Brisbane CERT welcomes the return of all trained CERT members in the community and encourages them to attend the next member meetings scheduled for 6:30pm on May 10 and 24 in City Hall in order to prepare for the upcoming local and county-wide CERT events in 2018. First up is the County's "Green Dawn Exercise" on June 7! DOING activities will be our focus to allow CERT Members to be ACTIVE in disaster preparation exercises and in service and support of the Brisbane Community.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program is a national effort to educate and train members of neighborhoods, community organizations, or workplaces in basic emergency response skills. Training promotes both a resident's ability to be self-reliant after a disaster and to participate at the community level in the partnering effort with emergency services. CERT is making a comeback in Brisbane and is planning to conduct a new member training academy in Brisbane this fall. 


